THE GLITTERING PRIZES

Winners

The Museum Folkwang in Essen, Germany, has awarded the €25,000 2016 Nam June Paik Award, for artists who work with digital media, to Lawrence Abu Hamdan.

The Scottish painter **Peter Doig** has won the Whitechapel Gallery's annual **Art Icon** award. The 2017 prize is due to be presented at the gallery on 25 January 2017.

The five winners of the Jerwood Makers Opens, which supports early-career artists, are Sam Bakewell, Juli Bolaños-Durman, Jessica Harrison, Marcin Rusak and Laura Young Coll. Each artist receives £7,500. Their work will be shown in a group exhibition at the Jerwood Space, London, in 2017.

The 89-year-old composer and artist Juan Hidalgo has been awarded the Visual Arts National Prize 2016 by Spain's ministry of culture.

The 2016 Hannah-Höch-Preis for outstanding lifetime achievement in art has been awarded to Cornelia Schleime by the state of Berlin. She receives prize money of €60,000. Meanwhile, Tatjana Doll has won the €20,000 Hannah-Höch-Förderpreis 2016, which is open to early-career Berlin-based artists. Both artists have solo exhibitions at the Berlinische Galerie (until 24 April 2017).

The Contemporary Austin has announced Rodney McMillian as the winner of the inaugural Suzanne Deal Booth Prize. He receives prize money of \$100,000 as well as a solo exhibition.

Thomas Girst, BMW Group's head of worldwide cultural engagement, has been named the European Cultural Manager of the Year for 2016 at Causales' 11th Cultural Brands Awards

Helen Marten has won the first £30,000 Hepworth Prize for Sculpture. An exhibition of works by the four shortlisted artists is on show at the Hepworth Wakefield (until 19 February 2017).

Shortlists

The Prix Pictet for photography relating to sustainability and the environment has announced its 12 shortlisted artists:

Mandy Barker, Saskia Groneberg, Beate Guetschow, Rinko Kawauchi, Benny Lam, Richard Mosse, Wasif Munem, Nishino, Sergey Ponomarev, Thomas Ruff, Pavel Wolberg and Michael Wolf. Their work will be exhibited at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London (6-28 May 2017). The winner of the CHF100,000 (£80,000) prize is due to be announced by the Prix Pictet's honorary president, Kofi Annan, on 4 May 2017.

New prizes

The Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art in Gateshead, north-east England, has announced a new artist award. The biennial Baltic Artists' Award aims to give four emerging artists an international platform and will be judged solely by artists. The prize includes a show at Baltic (opening on 30 June 2017), £25,000 to create new work and a £5,000 artist fee. The judges for 2017 are Monica Bonvicini, Mike Nelson, Pedro Cabrita Reis and Lorna Simpson.
